New book provides how-to steps on philatelic exhibits

reating and mounting new philatelic exhibits is never an easy task, but a most rewarding adventure for those willing to take the plunge. A new book by Andrew McFarlane makes the job of exhibiting a bit easier. Titled *First Day Cover Philatelic Exhibiting: A Master Class*, the massive 514

page book is a giant step forward for those considering exhibiting.

The book is dedicated exclusively to the creation of a first day cover exhibit, and guidance is provided for all levels of exhibitors: FDC collectors wanting to exhibit for the first time;

exhibitors with experience in other disciplines who would like to try FDC exhibiting; and experienced FDC exhibitors who are looking for ways to improve their exhibit.

As publisher Steve Zwillinger pointed out in his

Foreword, author Andrew McFarlane has set a new standard with the book. "However, it's not just about first day cover exhibitors; it's a comprehensive guide covering all mail classes, whether in

a first day cover exhibit or another class of exhibit," he wrote. "This broad coverage makes it a must-have for all exhibitors who incorporate stamps and covers in their exhibits, providing them with knowledge and confidence in their philatelic pursuits."

Beyond just instruction in preparing exhibits, the book also provides a primer of information on design, layout and stamp production. There is also extensive information the "building blocks" of first day cover production, from engraving, letterpress and lithography to hand-drawn cachets.

The book, published by Exhibitors Press in the 8.5 x 11 inch format, is priced at \$99 for hardcover and \$89 for softcover, and is available from Andrew Mc-Farlane, P.O. Box 669, Bartonsville, PA 18321. Autographed copies are available through ExhibitSynopsis. com.
